

The collection cover key areas such as the women's right to vote, the Standard Oil monopoly case, prohibition, reform of law enforcement, the University Settlement Society of New York City, and regulation of food and drugs. Of interest to scholars in American history and studies; peace, justice, and conflict studies, political science, public policy, cultural studies, and sociology.


<u>History Vault: Progressive Era: Voices of Reform, 1875-1945</u> consists of correspondence, writings, speeches, diaries, and photographs of five leading members of the Progressive movement: John R. Commons, Charles R. Van Hise, Richard T. Ely, Edward A. Ross and Charles McCarthy. Individually and collectively, these men carried out major reforms to address the problems caused by the growth of industrialization following the Civil War in areas like employment and child labor, education, taxation, elections, conservation, and regulation of food, public utilities, and corporations. This module offers valuable insight into both the theorizing and practical legislation of the Progressive Era. Of interest to scholars in history, political science, and public policy.
